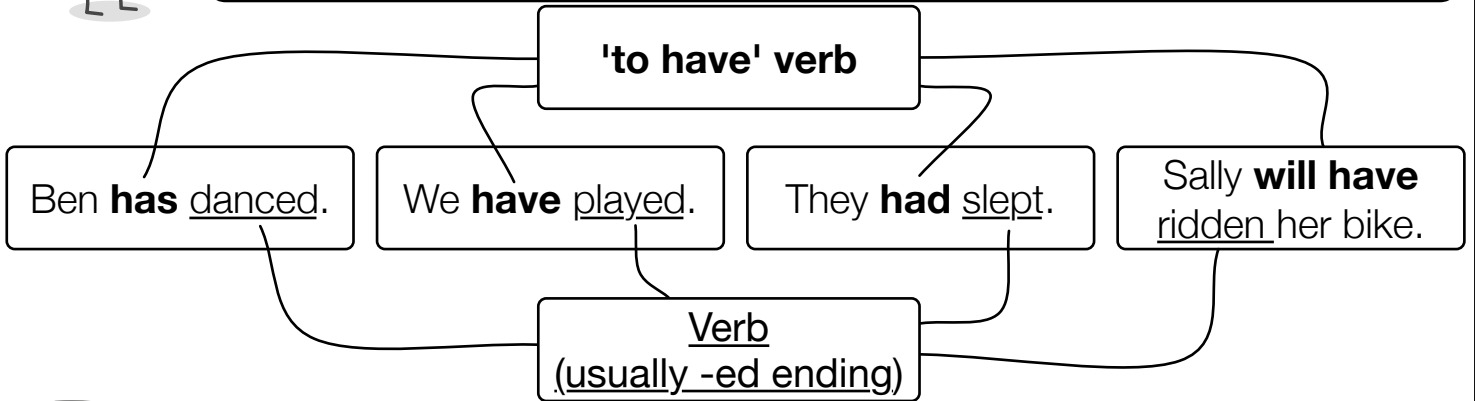

The children have enjoyed playtime.

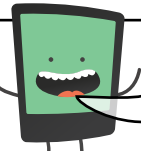
Ben has won the race.
