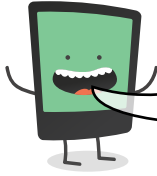




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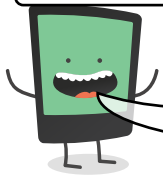
I can order modal verbs according to their likelihood.

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Modal verbs tell us how likely or how necessary something is.  
For each sentence below, circle the modal verb then tick to say  
whether it is possible (it might happen) or certain (it will happen).

Sentence	Modal verb indicates certainty	Modal verb indicates possibility
It should be warm and sunny tomorrow.		
Ben can run faster than anyone else.		
Sally might play football this weekend.		
Paul will be the first to go out to play.		



Different modal verbs can change the meaning of a sentence very slightly. Read each sentence below and decide how likely it is to happen. Draw a line linking the sentence to the scale, showing this likelihood.

Ben might win the race.	Beth will win the race.	Sally could win the race.	Paul should win the race.
